I want to make sure I understand you perfectly: you say it is “not disgusting” to compare the release of CO2 with genocide. Let me know how installing CFLs in my home (which I did years before it was fashionable, mind you) is going to prevent the locusts and fire-breathing prophets in

Nevermind that a greenhouse is a gross, gross, GROSS oversimplification of the systems that affect intercontinental climate. How many greenhouses have you found that have weather systems, and that contain large bodies of water, and are only partially insulated at any one time?

To get more complicated is fine for scientists who make testing their life's work, but for most people they don't have the time in the day to consider every variable that could affect climate on Earth. That's why it's important to have an example they can see, where if pollution is increased, then so too is temperature. If it doesn't scale to the globe, I'll eat my hat (assuming I'm wearing a hamburger).

I'm almost certain that propagating oversimplified ideas to perpetuate common ignorance is an irresonsible method of education. CO2 (which is not a pollutant) in a greenhouse does not scale to the globe, so I hope your hat-burger is delicious. The sad part is, the scientists whose life work is

supposed to be testing are also taking the shortcut with the greenhouse analogy, and then scaring the people who don't understand. The one thing that's more widely understood than over-simple metaphors is fear, and the popular "climate change experts" are handing out fear by the truckload. In the late 1970s, the fear-mongers were convinced that a global cooling trend was imminent; I suppose an altered message was able to bring the spotlight (and funding) back to them.

I will not admit that is an experiment because it is manifestly not an experiment. In scientific terms, an experiment has all pertinent variables controlled for so that cause can be established. At best, a naturally occurring situation may be described as a quasi-experiment, but any causal relationships inferred should not hold as "fact" when subjected to scientific rigor; to that point, true experimental results often do not hold up as fact in the face of scientific rigor. Something I think we can both agree on, however, is that the concept of anthropogenic (there's that word again) climate change has moved far, far, FAR beyond the purview of science. If correlation equalled causation, then pro basketball players are tall BECAUSE of the shoes they wear.

I do apologize for making unfounded assumptions about your beliefs— I overstepped the bounds of a discussion with you and extended discussion to some of the most militant environmentalists. However, your belief that humankind is somehow "destroying our ability to live in any region of the Earth" strikes me as a little bit, well, magical. Early hominids made out very well in the forests and plains of Africa during the last Ice Age, and another glaciation is actually a relatively likely result of open water at the poles. Contrary to popular belief, glaciers form because of an overwhelming amount of precipitation (snow); rather than forming because it is cold, it is actually cold because the snow a) is already cold and b) reflects up to ~90% of incoming solar radiation. Hopefully that last point illustrates the danger of explaining climatic phenomena in childish simple terms; if not, I have heard adults earnestly believe that thunder occurs when clouds bump together(!). Recently, the sun did a poor job adhering to its supposed 11-year cycle, and managed to put out much less energy than anticipated. At the same time, global warming trends virtually disappeared or reversed. Is it not conceivable that the sun, the sole source of energy input into a complex but ultimately closed global system, could be the primary factor in explaining climate variation? We agree, again, that less cars

and less consumption are good things. The sticking point, however, is that human pride and arrogance is so great that we believe we are responsible for every change or catastrophe that ever occurs, and we underestimate the resiliency and adaptability of the Earth's natural systems. In a thousand years, the idea of a "biodiversity crisis" may be a mythical concept... but the real "Inconvenient Truth" seems to be that my brand of optimism, as opposed to "millions of people are going to die in the next several years," "there won't be a single spot of arable land left," isn't what the general populace is interested in buying.

It's possible that it's not human caused climate change that is going on around us the last decades, but in context of pollution levels (and yes, CO(2) is a pollutant) I find it most reasonable to assume that our significant actions can have a negative effect. That's because if your theory is wrong and we are having a global negative effect, doesn't it seem like man slaughter AT BEST, and mass murder at worst?

I see we're both competing for 'longest comment awards', but on I go.

CO(2) is a pollutant for the simple reason that it's a waste gas, unintentionally scattered through the atmosphere using technology. Something can be naturally occurring, and still be a pollutant if it pollutes (befouls, soils, modifies) an otherwise natural location. We don't release additional water vapour, CO, CO(2), and other pollutants intentionally, but we can't claim that they aren't harmful (pollution) just because we don't mean harm in the actions that create pollution levels above a natural baseline.
